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Model of the Month

There were two members who were proud to show off their latest aircraft at the meeting. Larry K brought his Ryan STA plane that he had just recently finished.

And Jack B. brought his own design foam board creation EDF jet.



Jacks plane is a combination of F-35 and DC10 with a wingspan 30", and a length 42". The propulsion system is a Freewing 64 mm ,12 blade EDF, using a 4S battery, a 60 amp speed controller, front wheel from Marlin, Lights from Mamba 60. Weight w/o battery 2.25 lbs.

Larry's aircraft is a good looking Ryan STA, an ARF kit from Great Planes that he has not yet flown. It has very colorful lines of red, white and black, with a black and white checkerboard pattern on the bottom of the wing. The single cockpit and low wing design was custom-crafted for higher altitude aerobatic flying.

The members voted for the one they liked the best and Jack won a \$10 gift card for his own designed craft.

Both Larry and Jack did a great job of sharing their aircraft information.

Safety Building Tip:

Here is just a quick reminder of what can happen **quickly** with the Lipo batteries that we use to power our R/C toys.

This incident took place because of a motor mount bolt that was a little too long and extended into the battery compartment.

The incident took place, when the pilot (Sam L.) came in for a landing with his new Flite Test Foam Board 540 Edge. The aircraft does not have landing gear and just lands on its belly. This landing was a little rough and abrupt, so the battery slid forward and hit one of the motor mount bolts. Before Sam to get to the plane, it was up in flames.



Use this as a safety reminder of what can happen with the batteries. When building or repairing your next model, be mindful of these types of safety issues.

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Just Some Pictures...!


