TRAINING :

Pilots who may want a refresher, or **new members** with limited or no experience are welcome to request stick training time.

- Dr. Alex S. can be contacted at 732-816-1810 to arrange dual flying time. Call to schedule a time slot.
- Jack Baum is also a training instructor for the club. He has the clubs *Apprentice* and has a Spektrum buddy box system to assist those that need help.

• Brian Jimenez is a Training instructor. V.P. Brian is eager to help new pilots and give them their first buddy box training flight.

• Mike D. is offering Heli training for those interested. Contact Mike D. if this discipline of flight interests you. Mike is also a qualified fixed wing instructor.

After a few training sessions the trainee is expected to become a member and have his own plane and equipment.

Safety reminders:

- Our electric motors are not forgiving. They don't stop when they hit an object. Unlike a glow engine that will usually stop when it encounters something. The electric motor will continue to rotate causing destruction as it goes.
- Make one of your transmitter toggle switches a motor KILL switch.
- Be sure the throttle switch is DOWN before plugging in the battery.
- Don't start or test your aircraft on the picnic benches. Use the **start up** tables that are located in front of the spectator area.
- Don't wear loose clothing or lanyards that can get pulled into a prop.
- When running up an engine/motor stay clear of the prop. Don't stand in front of the propellor.
- Be sure your battery is secured in your aircraft. Don't let it flop around.
- * The receiver in the aircraft should be secured .
- * Be sure the receiver antenna wires are visible and in the correct orientation as recommended by the manufacturer. They can pick up interference from the servo wires that may cause problems.
- * When flying, please stand behind the pilot fence stations. This is for **your** safety.

- Verbally call your "take offs" and "landings" loud enough so other pilots hear your intentions. If you go onto the field, let others know.
- Please don't leave your trashed plane in the cans. Take

your debris with you. This has caused the club issues in the past. If you are a

smoker, Please pick up your cigarette or cigar butts. Don't leave them lying around.



If you bring your pets to the

field, keep them on a leash. Don't allow them to run around freely.

- Place your old batteries in the battery bucket so they can be disposed of properly.
- All members and guests must follow the field rules as posted on the bulletin board at the field.


Bring your plane, heli, quad, or what ever you fly, to the next meeting and share it with the group. Bring your latest aircraft to the next meeting.

I hope to get text or phone calls, with training stick time requests and line-up of students.



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We can't stress this enough:

Be sure your aircraft **is identifiable** to you. This means that you are required to have your AMA number, your Name, phone number and FAA number marked on your plane. It should be on the outside so in the event of a fly-away you can be contacted.



This particular F14 was lost a short time ago and found near the field by someone. It did **not** have the owners information on it. Luckily the finder contacted the club and gave his contact information to Larry. *Good ending:* The finder was contacted and he brought the F14 to its rightful owner.
